RHC STUDY DAYS AND EVENTS

We are delighted to announce that our study day **Canals in the Lancashire Landscape** on **Thursday 7 April** is now open for booking. This event will be held in the beautiful surroundings of Hoghton Tower. Located just off the A675 between Preston and Blackburn, this Grade I listed building is the ancestral home of the de Hoghton family. Hoghton Tower is the only true baronial hall in Lancashire and much of the current building dates from 1565. The Leeds and Liverpool Canal runs through the grounds, making the Tower a fitting venue for an event which will include discussion of that canal, which is marking its 200th anniversary this year, and also focuses on the Manchester, Bolton and Bury Canal. The day includes a presentation by artist Liam Curtin, who will talk about his 'Meccano Bridge' project over the canal at Little Lever. Space is strictly limited for this event, which includes an optional soup-and-sandwich lunch, and we strongly encourage early booking. Also, a reminder that you can still book for the **43rd Annual Archaeology Forum** on **Saturday 5 March**. Topics will include the exciting discoveries on the site of the Carlisle Northern Development Route, prehistoric discoveries in the Forest of Bowland, recent work on Early Iron Age socketed axes and the early history of railways in Britain. Bookings are also open for **The Raw Materials of History – publishing historical records** on **Saturday 23 April**. This event is organised in association with the Surtees Society in memory of Constance Fraser (1928-2013), who was one of the leading record scholars in the north of England; a generous subsidy

CHAPEL-LE-DALE HERITAGE ARCHIVE

RHC is pleased to report that we have a range of papers deposited in 2013 by Gerald Tyler, then of Winshaw, Chapel-le-Dale, near Ingleton, North Yorkshire, which are available to researchers by appointment. The materials were collected during research into the local history of Chapel-le-Dale (and, to a lesser extent, Ingleton) carried out in connection with rural regeneration projects in Ingleton parish, 2001-2005. Most of the papers relate to a series of local history publications written by Gerald Tyler, including *Sheep, Steam and Shows: farming life in Chapel le Dale* (2002) and *The Chapel of the Fells: the history of St Leonard's church, Chapel le Dale* (2003). The archive contains research notes, photocopies of archival sources, a few original documents, photographs and draft text. Subjects include St Leonard's Church; Chapel-le-Dale School the Mission to Settle-Carlisle Railway workers; local families; and Ribbleshead Sheep Show. The archive also contains a full photographic record of the Chapel-le-Dale valley c.2002-3. ELIZABETH ROBERTS' WORKING CLASS ORAL HISTORY ARCHIVE DIGITISATION PROJECT: UPDATE ON FUNDRAISING

Our January newsletter was able to report that we had raised over £15,000, and more money has come in since then so our current total is **£15,682**. We are pleased to acknowledge grants from the Aurelius Trust, the Historic Society of Lancashire and Cheshire, the Elspeth J. Thompson Charitable Trust, the Cumbrian Railways Association, Lancashire Local History Federation, the Friends of Lancashire Archives and the Friends of Cumbria Archives, as well as donations made by a number of individual supporters.

As a reminder, this project aims to digitise the transcripts of this internationally-significant oral history archive, and to create a fully searchable, largely open access, online resource. The funding will also enable a community history project developed in collaboration with archive offices at Barrow and Preston. This will involve volunteers interviewing family members of the original interviewees, asking about their reactions to hearing the interview(s) given by their forebear, and gathering historic photographs, and perhaps photographing relevant artefacts, to form an online exhibition for presentation alongside the transcripts and sound clips of the Archive.

Whilst we would encourage our Patrons, Friends and supporters to give their views on all elements of the proposals which interest them, we would like to particularly draw your attention to the consultations which relate to the county's heritage. In addition to the Archives consultation mentioned above, three online consultations are currently live: 'Lancashire museum consultation 2016', 'Museums: community ownership of assets and community service provision' and 'Historic Environment Service consultation'. Paper questionnaires for the museum consultation are available from Lancaster City Museum for those who do not wish to complete the on-line form.

As a reminder, the County Council has continually had to make financial savings over the past five years, both to offset the Government's cuts to its funding and to account for significant cost pressures brought about by high demand for many services. To help achieve the level of savings required to balance the books, new proposals affecting a wide range of services were taken to a meeting of the council's Cabinet on 26 November 2015. For the archive service the proposals mean a 33% reduction in service cost between now and the financial year beginning in April 2017. There are also specific proposals to close five of the county's museums from April 2016: the Museum of Lancashire in Preston, Fleetwood Museum, Queen Street Mill in Burnley, Helmshore Mills Textile Museum and Judges' Lodgings Museum in Lancaster. Five further museums, including Lancaster City Museum and Lancaster Castle, would be expected to fully cover their costs through a new charging policy implemented from 1 April 2016.

And finally: news from the **Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle upon Tyne:**

A group of volunteers have been carrying out a transcription project, on two of the documents in the Society's archives:

- The 1771 Tyne Flood Papers, a bound volume of documents from the relief fund for Northumberland set up after the calamitous floods in North-East England in November 1771. The volume covers the subscriptions paid in, claims for damage, and the compensation paid out. It is essentially the office file of the Secretary to the Fund, solicitor Lancelot Heron from Hexham; and
- The 1784 Poll Book is a record of the voting in the Newcastle Election of 1780 with additional manuscript notes from the 1784 election, made by the agent for Andrew Stoney Bowes of Gibside in the 1784 Parliamentary election for Newcastle upon Tyne.

The transcriptions of both are fully searchable. There is still work to be done on the databases, but once complete, they will also be able to provide the full contents in an Excel spreadsheet to bona-fide researchers, which will allow for extensive analysis.
